# The Dale E. Artfitch, Award

Dale Artfitch was a 4-H member in Go Karts for many years. In addition he was a member of the Funderne Rescue Squad and was instrumental in helping to form the EMS Angels of Central New Jersey. While he enjoyed racing his go-kart and riding his motorcycle, his passion was helping others.

On July 3, 2009, Dale entered eternal rest. Dale will always be remembered as a true friend to many-willing to help anyone, at any time, at any cost to himself.

4-H was an important part of Dale's life, and his friends and family are still involved. They have asked to honor his memory by recognizing a 4-H Member, 8<sup>th</sup> grade and older, who shares the positive qualities and characteristics that Dale demonstrated. The award will be presented at the end of Round Robin.

Dale's first connection with the Round Robin came about when he helped former 4-H leaders set up in the pouring rain because they needed his help. Dale even showed a cow in one of the Fairs for a 4-H'er who couldn't arrive in time even though he had absolutely no prior experience with cows.

You will be asked to vote on one person who has helped you throughout the 4-H year more than anyone else; the one person who embodies these characteristics. Will be awarded to a 4-H Member 8<sup>th</sup> grade and older who exemplifies the following qualities, voted for by their peers...

Set a good example.

Always show your gratitude.

Play by the rules. Don't look for ways to get around the rules.

Never express anger towards your project, the judge or other exhibitors.

Open your mind to others – listen and learn from 4-H advisors and other members.

Respect your competitors in and outside of 4-H. Be a gracious winner and a dignified loser

Help portray a positive image for 4-H.

Think before you act
